Duration of the activity:

Preparation and election together 1 schoolday.

Transferability Tip:

- Make it fun start with informal voting themes before introducing civic topics.
- Create a positive and supportive atmosphere where all students feel comfortable and valued.

Why is it a quick win?

Information about elections can be found in the local news and the date is available, voting is quick when there is paper and pen. Depending on the topic, the election can be held quickly with little preparation.
